It tells a distinctly Canadian story and its focus on the Southern Alberta region allows it to paint the picture in vivid detail. With its historical data enriched and enlivened through the human dimension of the oral histories, *Southern Hoofprints* entertainingly recounts

The Great Gymkhana Gamble
